# Spanish anthropologist is Mellon Scholar

Carmelo Lison-Tolosana, the most eminent practicing anthropologist in Spain, is visiting Cornell through Oct. 14 as a Mellon Visiting Scholar in the Institute for European Studies.

Lison-Tolosana will give one in a series of lectures and seminars on the anthropology and history of Spain on Wednesday, Sept. 29, at 4:30 p.m. in the Department of Anthropology Seminar Room, 215 McGraw Hall.

Currently professor of anthropology at the Universidad Compultense de Madrid, he also has served as chair for the Department of Anthropology and guided its development as the first large, comprehensive anthropology department in Spain.

Lison-Tolosana has written 14 books on topics ranging from the ethnography of Aragon and Galicia and the social anthropology of Spain to hermeneutics, witchcraft and ritual behavior. He also has edited four books on social anthropology and published more than 40 articles.

The first anthropologist ever elected to the Royal Academy of Moral and Political Sciences of Spain, Lison-Tolosana is also an honorary fellow of the Royal Anthropological Institute of Great Britain and was just awarded the Aragon Prize in the Social and Human Sciences.

Lison-Tolosana earned a doctorate in social anthropology from Oxford University and a second, with highest honors, from the Universidad Compultense de
